#### **OUR ORGANIZATION**

The Corner Food Pantry is a non-denominational charity offering one of the most basic human needs — nutritious food to people in need. All of our funding comes from private sources — our friends, neighbors, local organizations, foundations, churches and schools. Our administrative expenses remain low because we are an all-volunteer organization, so we can spend the private donations we receive to provide food for the hungry. And this year has posed the additional challenges of dealing with the COVID crisis (see our article on how the Pantry is responding).

#### **OUR COMMUNITY**

We have accomplished this thanks to the generosity of the individuals and organizations who have donated funds and food. We certainly could not operate as economically without the generosity of the Archdiocese of Hartford and St. Martin of Tours (St Mary's Church) for the use of the Pantry space. Most of all, though, our mission is fulfilled because of the tireless efforts of the many volunteers who give hours of their time.

Volunteers at the Pantry work every Friday morning to unpack boxes and stock shelves for the weekend distribution. Clients can come to the Pantry on Friday afternoon or Saturday morning to pick up food. We do our best to ensure that each person's dignity is honored and that all are treated fairly.

Volunteers also help by picking up food from area food drives and farms, unloading holiday turkeys, doing repairs to the building, meeting the Connecticut Food Bank delivery and unloading and storing the delivered boxes of food. We have a more detailed article about our volunteer program in this newsletter.

#### OUR RESPONSE TO THE COVID CRISIS

We are very pleased to have successfully remained open without interruption throughout the COVID crisis. Due to the tireless commitment and passion of our volunteers and staff, together with support from our generous donors, we have been able to meet the surge in demand for our services while implementing and maintaining strict adherence to suggested safety protocols.

We immediately instituted new practices according to the guidelines set forth by the CDC at the start of the pandemic in March 2020. These included shifting our distributions from in-person to a contactless arrangement, mandating the use of masks for clients, staff and volunteers, setting up hand sanitizing stations, and requiring 6 feet of distance between people. We have also distributed free reusable cloth masks to clients and staff as needed.

We will continue to adapt to the CDC's COVID-19 changing guidelines to keep everyone as safe as possible while serving our community to the best of our ability, now and into the future.



- Pre-pack shelf-stable food for distribution, Friday
   9AM-1PM
- Pre-pack fresh vegetables, Friday 3-4PM
- Distribute food to clients, Friday 4-6PM and Saturday 8:30-10AM. Beginning November 6, Friday distribution will be 2:30-4PM
- Provide administrative assistance such as mailing, data entry, filing
- Develop content to post on our website, serve as our public relations liaison writing press releases, and provide information to our local town newsletter
- Dispose of empty boxes at the Salisbury/Sharon Transfer Station
- Deliver food to home-bound clients, Saturday 10AM-noon (dependent upon need)
- Help pick up/unload food deliveries and organize food at the Pantry (times vary)



As the chart illustrates, activity at the Pantry has risen sharply since the onset of the pandemic. Since April the number of individuals being served each month has more than doubled to roughly 1845 per month versus 825 for the prior 6 months.

Since the beginning of the year, the Pantry has served almost 3200 Households which includes 12,100 individuals.

This represents more than 108,000 meals and over 130,000 pounds of food!
